Emily Pilloton fervently believes that design solutions can empower people, community, and economies, and she has set out to prove her point by challenging the design world to join her in building those solutions:

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Project H Design

Emily Pilloton is the founder and director of Project H Design (design initiatives for Humanity, Habitats, Health, and Happiness), a nonprofit design and architecture nonprofit that connects the power of design to the people who need it most, and the places where it can make a real and lasting difference. Project H has a core focus on using design and full-scale building projects to activate public education systems in the US and to provide a more engaged learning framework for K-12 students, particularly in rural communities. For her most recent initiative, Studio H, Emily is teaching a high school design/build program in the poorest county in North Carolina.

Project H has also created the Learning Landscape, an active educational playground that promotes more engaged outdoor learning. Other projects implemented by local Project H teams around the country include therapeutic spaces for children in foster care homes in Austin, a public school curriculum focused on local food production and waste in New York, and a homeless-run design enterprise in Los Angeles.

Eloquent and passionate about her mission, she lectures on the importance of social action and building, the design revolution, design for empowerment, low-tech, hands-on built solutions. She believes that design should not be focused on "want-driven" consumption of in luxury markets, but rather "need-driven" solutions for all demographics traditionally overlooked by the design market.

Emily is an industrial designer, architect, writer, and builder. In the past she has contributed to magazines such as GOOD, FastCompany, ReadyMade, Interior Design, ID Magazine and Innovative Home. Her work has been reported and showcased on The Colbert Report, and in The New York Times, Metropolis Magazine, Dwell Magazine, and GOOD Magazine.



Studio H

Studio H a high school design/build program in rural Bertie County, North Carolina, the poorest and most sparsely populated county in the state. Integrated into the public high school curriculum, Studio H teaches students design thinking and handson construction skills to build one big public project for local community benefit each year. Every project will be designed and built by students alongside their instructors.

The first projects are inspired by Bertie County's agricultural economy and high obesity rates: an open-air farmer's market plaza and public chicken coops. Studio H hopes to infuse rural public education with design activism, and in doing so, apply public education to greater community development.
