#### **International Update**

# Justice, Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion Committee (JEDI)

Members – This is an opportunity to affect and shape A4LE policy on an international level.

The Regional Board recently added 2 positions to grow the JEDI awareness and involvement and to liaison with the international committee. We would like to welcome Faye Strong as the Canadian representative, and Ruwan Jayaweera in the USA. Faye and Ruwan will both bring a tremendous amount of insight to this role and we welcome their guidance.

#### Get Involved; Stay Engaged; Change the World

We invited Faye to introduce herself and tell us a little more about what inspired her interest in the JEDI committee:

"My name is Faye Strong, I work for a firm in Cochrane, Alberta, as an ALEP and a Canadian Gold Seal Construction Manager. My work focuses on Indigenous (FNMI) education infrastructure. My dream is to see equitable learning environments established within Indigenous Communities that support traditional languages and pedagogies. Too many Indigenous Students in Canada must leave their communities in order to complete their education and consequently leave behind language, culture, and the support of the families and communities. Most of these communities have sufficient demographics to justify K - 12 programs and facilities. I work with Youth, Educators, Elders, Knowledge Keepers, Language/Cultural Instructors, and Community Leaders to document retention, demographics, and education programing requirements. The traditional methods of sharing knowledge within Indigenous Communities are effective and engaging; they have a higher rate of retention than Eurocentric education programs. Out of concern for the lack of infrastructure within these communities, as a volunteer, I have met with federal and provincial departments to try to build understanding and close the gap on capital funding. As I see programs building within communities, I see youth gaining confidence to overcome the impact of colonialism in Canada."

Board members Paul Blaser and Heather Morgan took part in a 5k walk on May 5<sup>th</sup> to promote awareness for murdered and missing Indigenous women and girls (MMIWG), organized by the Tsow-Tun Le Lum First Nation.

# 2021 Pinnacle Award – Registration now open!

The Pinnacle Award Program recognizes outstanding educational facilities in the Pacific Northwest Region. The program follows criteria from the Association's LEsolutions Planning & Design Awards Program, to encourage regional projects to also compete at the international level.

This program recognizes learning projects which positively impact teaching and learning and result from a sound planning process reflecting the needs and expectations of the community. With robust building activity in SK, we should see some great entries!

**Eligible Projects:** Built preK-12 learning environment projects completed in the last **4 years** in Alaska, Alberta, British Columbia, Hawaii, Idaho, Montana, Oregon, Saskatchewan and Washington are eligible. These include learning environments designed for early childhood learning, elementary, middle/junior high and high schools, alternative schools (e.g. charter schools, magnet schools), and other innovative learning environments (e.g. museums, outdoor education facilities).

Award Type: Trophy for Pinnacle Award. Paper Certificates for Projects of Distinction and Honorable Mention.

#### Award Categories:

- Pinnacle Award Awarded to the single most distinctive project, which best satisfies the criteria; one winner.
- Project of Distinction These awards recognize exceptional projects that were not the Pinnacle Award winner but were deserving of recognition according to the criteria. Number of awards is at the Jury's discretion, if any.
- Honorable Mention Given at the discretion of the jury for some outstanding and compelling component of the project.
