The Art and Science Driving the Transformation of Learning Environments

Every day, real things happen in our world that profoundly transform the experience of our students, teachers, and communities and have a direct and immediate impact on the planning, design, and construction of learning environments.

As stakeholders in the design and operation of learning spaces, we must respond to these 'real things' in the most effective ways possible, ensuring that learning environments support everyday experiences and normal day-to-day intentions, as well as more extraordinary life events.

This theme explores the tracks of Research, Response, and Resiliency through the lenses of Art and Science. It provides a framework for describing the values, attitudes, knowledge, and skills required for effective collaboration among key constituents to improve the planning, design, and construction of school facilities.

Art describes a process that is intuitive, imprecise, subjective, and reflects skills developed through practice and imagination. Science involves a process that includes research and measurement and strives to be objective. A series of school tours and workshops organized by track explores this theme.

Keynote Speaker

Dr. Tyrone C. Howard

Tyrone Howard is a professor of education in the School of Education & Information Studies at UCLA. His research addresses issues tied to race, culture, access and educational opportunity for minoritized student populations. Professor Howard is the author of several best-selling books. He is a native of Compton, California where he also served as a classroom teacher. Professor Howard is a member of the National Academy of Education and has been listed by Education Week as one of the 30 most influential educational scholars in the nation on education practice, policy, and research. Professor Howard is currently the President-elect of the American Education Research Association, which is the nation's largest organization focused on educational research and policy.

My high school has contributed to the quality of my education in a variety of ways. Ten years ago, our school underwent renovations where there were many features include to benefit student learning. Multiple commons areas were provided, where students can work on projects as a group comfortably and lay out all their ideas on large tables to get a clear vision of any necessary improvements. The ability to discuss and work in a group setting has caused discussion and peer-based learning to flourish. Additionally, our library was converted into a multi-learning facility for students of all ages. Asides from the large selection of book recourses, there is a conference area for presentations, a wide sliding door to accommodate large groups, and multiple work sections throughout. These features aid learning in a variety of ways. It is beneficial to get out of the classroom and do work, and the set-up of our library makes this possible. The conference area allows for us to host authors and speakers, and their presentations are doubly as personal and easy to learn from as compared to being hosted in the gymnasium.

The biggest recourse I feel our school has created to benefit learning is the individualized learning compartments. There are small rooms/office spaces throughout the school that are specifically for the students. Our students can utilize these rooms independently, or with a learning support teacher, social worker, or career/guidance counsellor. All kids learn at different paces, and that is why it is extremely important that there be a space for them to do so. It is not always a reality to stand up and fidget, be in a totally silent environment or work through problems out loud in a classroom. Yet this is exactly what some kids need to learn and better their understanding of concepts. These individualized rooms allow for students to learn at their own pace, in a safe and controlled environment that encourages creativity and understanding.

If I could propose any change to our high school, it would be that the bathrooms move away from being one large space with stalls. I think five or six private individual style restrooms that include a toilet and a small garbage with communal sinks outside the restroom would aid learning in a significant way. Alike many others, my school is facing problems including vandalism, vaping and hordes of students hanging out in the bathroom during class time. If the bathrooms were individualized the amount of time kids spent outside the classroom would be greatly reduced, thus increasing the time they were in class, learning new material.

List of My Involvements

I am a part of the Saskatchewan Youth Council, where I provide insight and recommendations on how to better schools across Saskatchewan. I am a member of the student leadership committee, and a student representative for the school community council. I took a large leadership role on a fundraiser for a help centre for victims of domestic abuse, as well as working at senior lunch's our community has put on. I am a part of a club volleyball team and I was the captain of my schools volleyball team.
