What are the essentials for a thriving community?

How do you repair a city fractured by injustice and inequality?

In Memphis, these questions are not abstractions; they are the driving force of an effort to transform over one million square feet of abandoned warehouse space into a regenerative waystation of artistic expression, experiential education and holistic wellness.

This is Crosstown Concourse, an audacious experiment to create a city within a city that fosters curiosity, discovery and imagination, and provokes active and experiential learning and engagement.

But if that is Crosstown Concourse, what is Crosstown High, the new public high school that will be one of its founding tenants?

What should a school that is nestled within a vertical urban village actually look like, and feel like, and do?

How closely should its values mirror the values of the ecosystem that surrounds it?

How far should it dare to lean in the direction of what school must become, as opposed to what it has always been?

A stage full of parents from around the city – half of them Crosstown parents, and half from across the rest of the city's nearby schools – are sitting in a circle of chairs. Each is holding up an 8"x11" black in-white photo of a son or daughter of one of the other parents in the circle, someone shey met only in the last hour. The adult holding the photo reads out load a "parent-to-a-child wish" written on the back of the photo. Later in the evening, the full set of photos and wishes will be posted in the main gallery space of the Concourse, allowing residents of Memphis to begin to see the shared aspirations all parents have for all children of the city.

A conference room -- covered in floor-toceiling glass on both of its longer sides -stands ready to be reserved between the bustling Concourse High School learning spaces and the equally bustling Concourse public spaces. On the wall it an embedded Pad. It is a Stunday. A 12th grader enters his reservation request for the space where he will later host the third episode of the "Crosstown Mentrocast" podosat, hosting local professionals to discuss the intersection between creativity, wellness, and visidom that continues to emerge in the Concourse and Memphis at Jarge. Crosstown partners (and friends") will be allowed to listen to the five version via a members only video app.

The monthly Photo Scavenger Hunt is about to begin. Teams of 9th grade advisees stand outside the Concourse in the landscaped public space. Each one of them has been handed a sealed envelope which contains the 'theme' for this month's hunt. Each team — with their advisor — will be given five hours to explore downtown Memphis with their cameras aand smartphones, looking for creative photographic responses to the 'theme.' The school's Executive Director introduces three leaders from Crosstown organizations who will serve as judges for this month's curated exhibit.

A jazz musician plays in the Concourse lobby. Nearby stands an 11th grade boy with a pjece of paper in his hand. The musician begins to slow down the pace of his piece, casually looking over at the student. He nods. The boy nods back and pulls the microphone stand closer to him. As the musician's playing quiets slightly—shifting from a solo effort to an accompaning backbeat—the boy quietly starts to read his poem. At first, he is nervous. This is his first funchtime 'Poetry Beat' performance, the first time he has read his own poem out loud in public as the artist-in-residence supports him musically, Later that day the student and artist will return to the school to listen to a recording of the combined piece. They will discuss how to better balance the sound of the voice with the sound of the instrument to make the greatest impact on the audience. And over the next few weeks, the musician will attempt to compose a unique piece of music that will be recorded along with the student's spoken word piece in the nearby sound studie.

Every Wednesday morning for three hours, a seam of local artists, medical practitioners, and educators meet in the 5th floor. "Wender and Curiosity Studio", "Atelier", "Experiental Garage", and "Spark Lab"—as well as a range of "Collaboration Zonist"—as part of the "Cross-trown Human Library. "While students are the primary benefactors of the stories and questions being answered, each of the Human Library conversations are recorded and broadcast live to the world, allowing absent students, parents, Crosstown partners, and Memphis residents to take advantage of the growing library of lived experience and expertise. Teachers also look at the weekly event as a way to generate new ideas for future projects as well as to find alles who can return to work with individual students and teams on student-generated efforts.

In the auditorium, the lights go out. Filmmakers from around the country have come together to present original documentary films about the evolution of communities within changing urban neighborhoods. The first film is about to begin. It is a product of a Christian Brothers university film class that teamed up with Crosstown Arts. Teacher Town, and Memphis Teacher Residency. The two 11th graders who were selected to be event interns for the year stand alightly off stage looking at the full audience. They can't believe that they were able to pull this off as unpaid interns while taking a full set of classes, playing in a local Uttimate Frisbee league the school joined last year, and mentering local middle school writers at story booth after school. But one thing they've learned over the past few years is that this is just how it's done at Crosstown High.











REIMAGINE

Conceived in response to the XQ Super School call to rethink the American high school, Crosstown High at its foundation is a learning lab.

Partnering with students. educators, and community leaders, we had the opportunity to reimagine the school house archetype by rethinking the conventional classroom. eschewing locker-lined corridors, and creating a collaborative, energetic, flexible environment that supports an evolution in education that discourages rote memorization and encourages teachers and students alike to grow as learners, innovators, and change makers.

DEFINE

Fundamental to our initial design process, students, through a series of workshops, used words, images, and even Legos to explore what their ideal high school should be.

A word cloud was generated (bottom right) graphically depicting the strongest, most often expressed ideas.

These words: energetic, innovative, fun, bright, futuristic, inspiring, became our design drivers.







Formerly a Sears distribution center, a one million square foot building lay vacant for nearly two decades before its rebirth as Crosstown Concourse, a vibrant hub for education, wellness, and the arts. This iconic Art Deco structure is supported by oversized concrete columns, 20 feet on center. A low floor to floor height of only 10 feet and a large overall floor plate left the space feeling dark and void of natural light.

Design Challenges:

- Create flexible, dynamic adaptable, space within a tight, rigid grid.
- Introduce natural light and views throughout.
- Provide modern infrastructure (HVAC, plumbing, power, data) without creating low ceiling conditions.













Each Basecamp is home to a group of students with a common focus and identified with its own unique vivid color.

BRIGHT

A unique color identifies each individual Basecamp Portal enhancing wayfinding and bringing visual interest and identity.

These colorful Portals become the threshold between public and private, circulation and Basecamp.

Large barn doors connect the Portal to each Basecamp allowing the learning environment to flow freely in and out, when appropriate.









ADAPT

Within each Basecamp, large garage doors connect the Collaborative Core to the flanking Classrooms.

Garage doors can be lowered to create more intimate learning spaces.

Conversely, garage doors can be left wide open for maximum flexibility and collaboration.

A variety of furniture options support individual student needs and promote an active learning environment to enhance student engagement.

Beanbags and soft cubes, rocking stools, and standing height tables allow for dynamic and flexible seating arrangements.











INNOVAT

The Learning Commons weaves its way around the basecamps serving as both circulation and flexible learning environment.

The distinct green paths in the adjacent plan are symbolic of different students charting their own individualized educational path.

Columns and brick walls were intentionally left raw throughout the space creating a clear juxtaposition between old and new, past and present, historic and contemporary.

Acoustic ceiling spray and playful clouds were strategically used to dampen sound while maximizing ceiling height.

INSPIRE


The East Atrium brings natural light into the center of the fourth and fifth floors and provides views into other tenant spaces, glimpses of community partners in action.
